
Far from hindering her career reincarnation, Shamsee finds that

clients are far more inclined to trust her to keep a keen eye on their budget thanks to her background. In fact, her Highgate client initially reached out to her after a Google search revealed she attended the London School of Economics, his own Alma Mater.

"That was a funny connection," laughs Shamshee. "We've ended up becoming quite good friends." She worked closely with the couple over the course of six months. Initially they had only engaged her to do the dining room, but quickly realised they wanted

her to cast her eye over the entire three storey townhouse. "The longer we spoke the more he wanted us to do," she explains.

"It was very collaborative," Shamsee says of the project. "He was very hands on. He was ringing me in the middle of the night with ideas he had." Her client had very firm ideas about using a muted colour palette throughout, but Shamsee managed to slip in a whisper of very dark navy blue in the kitchen / diner "to tie in with the garden outside."

Adding in the bi-folding doors was a particularly inspired move, allowing the dining area to open out onto the terrace for a seamless summer evening of entertainment.
